- What do you like to photograph?

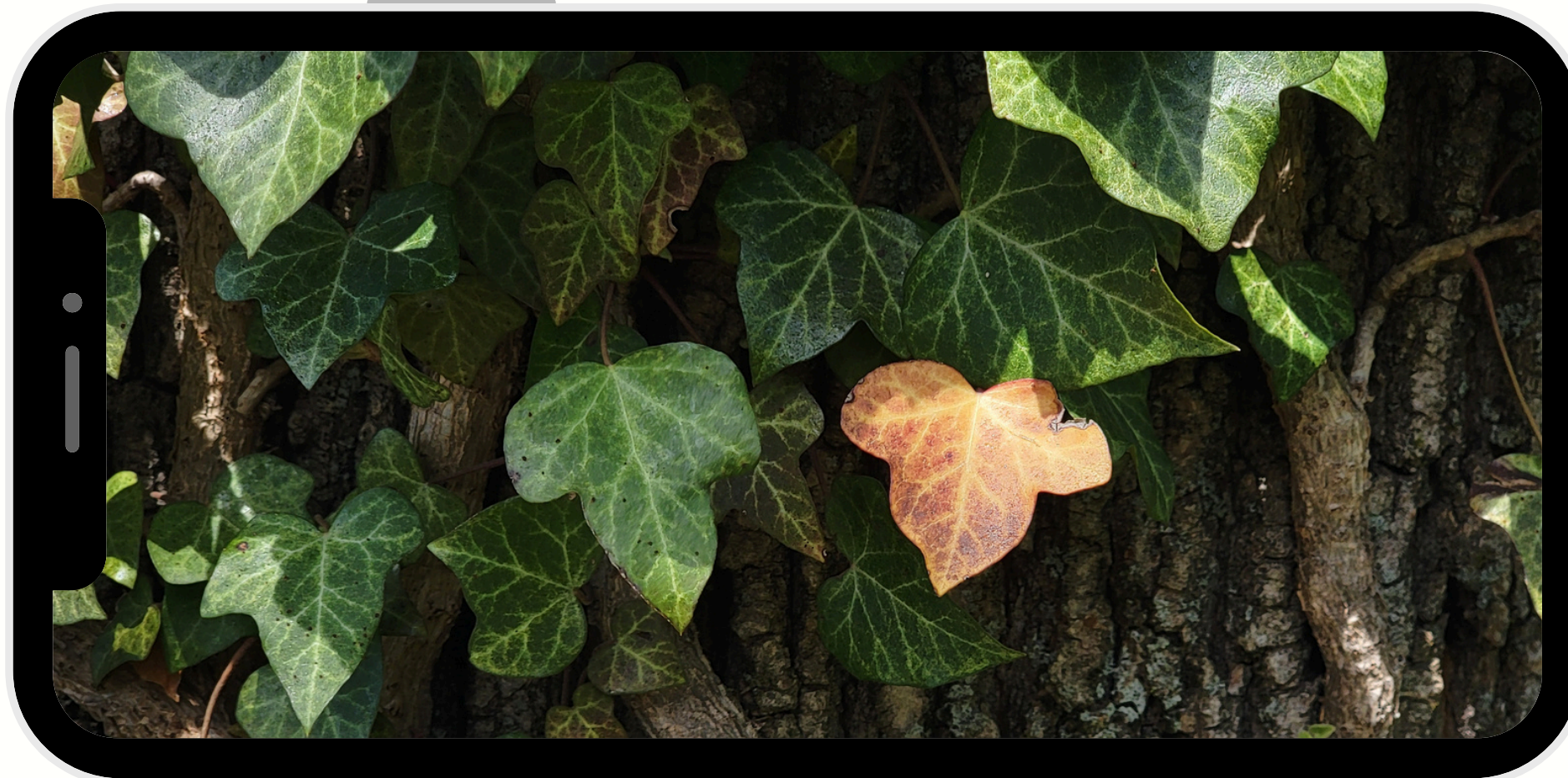


Why You Should Love Your Phone's Camera

- The lenses
 - Wide lens
 - Ultra wide lens (as wide as 7mm)
 - Macro
 - Telephoto
- The convenience
 - Lightweight
 - Less intimidating to others
- There's beauty in the mundane, and a phone helps to capture these fleeting moments

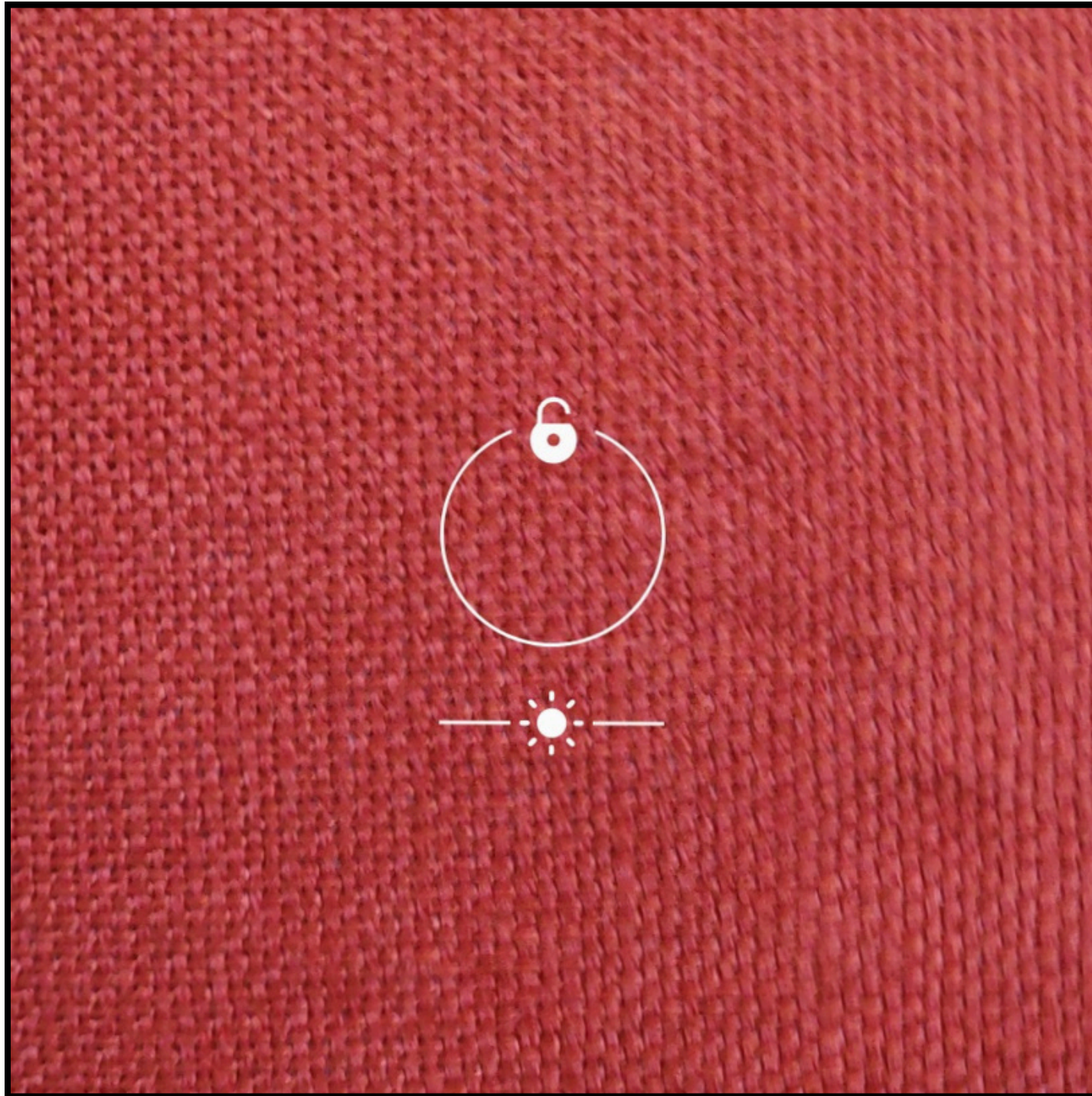
Orientation & Cleanliness

- 📷 Portrait vs. Landscape
- 📷 Hold your phone properly: two hands, elbows in, and keep fingers off the lens!
- 📷 Clean your lens — smudges and fingerprints can ruin a great shot



Focus, Exposure & Lock

- 📷 Tap to focus
- 📷 Slide to adjust exposure (brightness)
- 📷 Lock it in!



Zoom & Crop With Caution

- 📷 Zooming in can be tricky,
don't over zoom!
- 📷 Zoom with your feet!
- 📷 Crop to straighten and/or to enhance
slightly, but avoid stretching your pixels





Composition: Seeing Like a Photographer

- 📷 Composition means how we frame our image.
- 📷 Use the grid settings. Helps with the Rule of Thirds: place your subject off-center for a more interesting photo.
- 📷 Try different angles! Don't just shoot at eye level.
- 📷 Check your corners. Are there any distractions (like lamp posts or trash cans)?
- 📷 Keep the horizon line straight. Tilting the photo can feel disorienting.

Built in Modes



Portrait

- Focuses on the subject and blurs the background
- Great for people, pets, flowers, etc.
- Creates a soft, professional-looking photo
- Tap to focus, then hold steady and shoot



Night

- Helps take better photos in low light
- Blends multiple shots to make one brighter image
- Works best when you hold the phone steady
- Look for a moon icon or timer on screen



Pro

Gives manual control over settings like:

- ISO (light sensitivity)
- Shutter Speed (motion or light)
- White Balance (color tone)
- Manual Focus
- Exposure
- Great for creative control and tricky lighting

Simple Edits

Crop & Straighten

Careful not to over crop & straighten horizon.

Color Treatment

Toy with black & white, muted colors, and hue changes. Get creative here!

Adjustments

Adjust brightness, contrast, black point, dehaze, ect.
